Fitzsimmons Allison</u> – This book is a summary of the various Christological debates in the early church, written in a very straightforward style by an Episcopal Bishop. He makes use of the Nicene Creed and surveys the development of Trinitarian theology and how it arose because of the need to correct false or incorrect understandings of God and Jesus Christ in the Early Church.

"On the Incarnation of the Word of God" by St. Athanasius — one of the greatest works in the Early Church on the Trinity. Athanasius was Bishop of Alexandria in the fourth century and a staunch defender of the full divinity of Christ at the <u>First Ecumenical Council at Nicaea</u> in 325 AD. <u>The Athanasian Creed</u> (BCP p. 864) attributed to him and bearing his name is the cornerstone of orthodox Trinitarian theology.
